2015 AHS REGION 6 SERVICE AWARD:

Everett & Chris Crainer



In the spring of 2003, the Brazosport Daylily Society held a plant sale at the Lake Jackson, Texas, Brazos Mall. Everett Crainer came and was totally surprised by the daylilies & other plants that were for sale there. Immediately, Everett called his wife, Chris, and told her and their friend to get down to the Mall and bring the checkbook. That day started a new change for their life - daylilies.

The club had a garden tour planned for their next month's meeting so Everett & Chris came, along with a friend. They have been running ever since.



Everett & Chris joined AHS in 2003, and when the time came that they could become AHS Garden Judges and Exhibition Judges, they joined right in.

In 2008, several Houston area daylily clubs hosted the AHS National Convention. When the individual who was to hold all of the auction plants for the National Convention passed away, Everett stepped up to the plate and said that he and Chris would keep all the potted plants alive and bring them to the auction.

Chris served as 2012-13 Region 6 Exhibition Judges Liaison until Everett's health issues dictated that she didn't have the time for this service. Those health issues have not kept them from serving on Exhibition Judges Master Panels at the Regional Meetings, serving as Exhibition Judges for various clubs throughout Region 6, and other services that they could be counted on such as holding and teaching Exhibition Judges Clinics.

At the 2013 Fall Region 6 Symposium and Meeting, all the daylilies given as gift plants were furnished by the Crainers. At the Regional Meeting auctions, they can always be counted on to furnish auction plants.

Of course, Everett started to hybridize, and he now shares his hybridizing experiences with all who are willing to ask and listen.

Both Everett & Chris are constantly showing "newbies" how to groom daylily scapes for daylily flower shows, so they can become winners.

Everett served as 2007-09 President of the Brazosport Daylily Society. Chris served as 2010 President of the club. Both have served as 2nd Vice President (Program Chair) for the club. Chris has served as Flower Show Chair for the club for many years.

The Crainer garden is always open for visits with other clubs and was on the 2015 Region 6 Meeting Garden Tour.

Everett's health issues have not kept them from attending Regional Meetings nor AHS National Conventions. Dialysis sessions have not slowed Everett down in participating in daylily functions.

Congratulations to Everett & Chris Crainer for being selected as 2015 AHS Region 6 Service Award recipients.

We had a wonderful Regional Meeting this year which was well attended. A special thanks is in order to the Lone Star Daylily Society and to all their members for hosting this event. The weather held up for our tours and we were able to stay dry and enjoy everyone's garden. Each garden was well presented and we added some new favorite daylily names to our wish list.

I have updates from the AHS National level I want to share with our members as follows:

1. Kevin Walek has decided to retire from his position as the AHS Registrar. Please contact Nikki Schmith AHS Vice President if you are interested in this role. The Summer *Journal* will have an advertisement for this position. Applications are due by September 15 with the new Registrar announced at the Fall Board Meeting.
2. Membership levels have decreased by 10% from October 2014 due to non-renewals but usually pick up by September. ***However, the membership levels from April 2014 to April 2015 have increased slightly by 2% as noted in the chart at the end of this article.*** Membership numbers are a moving target and are updated on a regular basis.

3. Club Recognition Program:

Each Club President must send to me their current handbook. I am sure there are other clubs in our Region that may not realize that they have achieved status in this program. Once I have the club roster and see who on the list is an AHS member I can work with Pat Mercer, Meg Ryan, Tim Fehr and have the club recognized on the AHS website and in the *Journal*. If a club president does not have email they can designate a person in their club to be the contact person listed for the website. Keeping everyone updated is important for the Regional members.

Clubs in the Platinum and Gold levels will be in the drawing at the November Board Meeting to win the \$500 award to be used for plant orders from participating nurseries in the voucher program. Clubs are responsible for shipping and other costs.

4. Keep your calendars updated with our Regional Meeting for 2016 to be a Fall Symposium in Dallas. The 2016 AHS National Convention will be in Louisville, Kentucky, 2017 will be in Norfolk, Virginia and 2018 will be hosted by the Georgetown Daylily Society. Great job and effort by Region's 6 Eddie Raye Andrews to line up 3 AHS Conventions for us to participate.
5. Have a wonderful summer and please contact us if you have any ideas for improving our Region. Tim Closs and all the members on the executive board are very interested in hearing your thoughts.

Speaking of the Regional auction, the auction was record setting!! With the outstanding plants secured by Malcolm Avaritt, Paul Eskine, Everett Crainer, and many other members, the monetary health of the Regional newsletter and, the Region in general, is on very solid ground.

Thanks to everyone who participated and bought auction plants. A special thanks to everyone who helped facilitate the auction, I know we ran long again this year, but with the quantity and QUALITY of the plants, it was well worth it. Paul Eskine, you are a lean, mean daylily growing machine! If you are interested in becoming part to the auction team, please contact Malcolm or myself. We are looking more people to learn the mechanics of the auction and to help with the behind the scenes details (or be one of the auctioneers!) that go into making the auction a success.

I know that there are more detailed Meeting minutes within the Regional Secretary's report concerning ideas presented at the Region 6 business session, but I'd be remiss not to note some highlights. The Daylily Growers of Dallas has stepped to the plate and agreed to host a 2016 Fall Symposium/Regional Meeting. The club has already secured speakers and a location and will finalize details early this fall. Look for more specifics in the winter Regional newsletter. I think it is essential to the health of the Region for members to support **ALL** Regional Meetings with the same gusto as the 2015 Regional in Pearland. We are still soliciting clubs to host the 2017 and 2018 Regional Meetings, so please talk to your home club about these dates. The Regional officers are here to help, please contact any Regional officer and we will help you get started. It takes 18 months or more to work out all details for a large Regional, one day symposiums much less. I am still looking for volunteers for our Regional Meeting taskforce detailed in the last newsletter, please email me directly.

The Region voted to hold a contest drawing for clubs who have outstanding participation in the AHS Popularity Poll. Clubs with over 75% participation in the Popularity Poll voting will be entered into a drawing for a \$200 prize to the club. Remember, you must be an active paying AHS member to participate in the Pop Poll. This is another opportunity to encourage club members to join the AHS. You know what benefits you derive from being members, for \$25 a year. The AHS *Journal* and Regional newsletter are worth that much alone!

The Region has instituted a new program to help defray some of the travels costs of Garden and Exhibition Judges Instructors travelling to conduct workshops and clinics at the club level. These sessions are the level 1 sessions that are computer-based and are the first step in becoming a Judge. I'd like to suggest that EVERY club try to schedule at least one of these sessions this fall or winter. Want to grow better daylilies, become a Garden Judge. Want to perform better at the Daylily Flower Shows, become an Exhibition Judge. We need more Judges! We need more

Judge Instructors! We need YOU!

Finally, the Region committed to provide daylilies for a special historical Region 6 hybridizers bed at the 2017 AHS National Convention to be hosted by the Tidewater Daylily Society. We published a list of possible plants in the last newsletter. If you or your club would like to participate in this project, please let myself or Malcolm Avaritt know as soon as possible. We need to ship clumps of selected plants early this fall so they can become established. The Region will pick up itemized shipping costs.

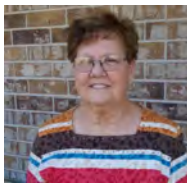

We had a wonderful Regional Meeting this year and many attendees viewed wonderful flowers that we may not have seen before this Meeting. Every year, each AHS member is asked to vote on their ten favorite cultivars.

Recently, Region 6 received feedback from other Regions asking why our Popularity Poll has so many older cultivars. I thought about this comment and realize that this would be a great research article for our Region with its many climatic zones, differing soil conditions, pH levels ranging from 6.4 to 8.4, high elevations in New Mexico and other varying growing conditions. Coming from the Northeast, I was able to grow flowers with ease but not so in Houston especially in July-September. It was much easier to raise plants when they have a time to go dormant and regain their strength but not so for many of us in this Region. For folks moving into Region 6 and wanting to grow our favorite flowers, the Popularity Poll is a great resource of the tried and true which have survived our climatic variations within a large geographic Region. If you look at the top 100 cultivars on this year's ballot we have 100 flowers listed which extends the top ten to the top 100 our AHS members have voted on and considered to be winners. So let's vote again this year and see the results for 2015!!

The Popularity Poll Ballot is attached to this edition but is also available on the "AHS website" under the quick link (left hand) side. Members are to scroll down to "Popularity Poll" and select "Region 6" and the Poll selection will appear for them to select their 10 favorite daylilies. They are to complete the form as noted below for voting requirements. Also the Popularity Poll is available online at: http://www.ahsRegion6.org/popularity_Polls.htm This ballot of 100 daylilies is based on the results from 2014 on the most voted cultivars up to the top 100. Call to Order - Tim Closs facilitated the meeting and introduced the agenda for the meeting and advised attendees that Velia Sanchez-Ruiz resigned the position of Exhibition Judges Liaison due to personal reasons.

R. Valenza (Secretary) - Minutes from Executive Meeting (May 30, 2014) will be summarized to membership at dinner meeting.

Financial Report (M. Avaritt) – Report to be published in upcoming Summer 2015 Region 6 Newsletter. Malcolm advised Board that the beginning balance as of Jan. 01, 2015 was **\$36,775.48**. Board budgeted \$ 12,000 for funding the Region 6 Newsletter which costs continue to go up each year. Motion passed by Board to have Region 6 provide \$ 200 to AHS' W. E. Monroe Endowment Fund in honor of Josie Bomar. Malcolm presented and Debbie

Pike seconded the motion.

Committee Reports:

Director's Report (M. Valenza) – Reviewed current AHS membership statistics with board. Numbers showed a slight improvement from 2014 to 2015 in membership at approximately 2%.

AHS Recognition program has gained some momentum with 6 clubs for Region 6 participating. Platinum and Gold membership levels clubs will have their name drawn at Fall Board Meeting in Virginia on November 7. Award for 2015 is \$ 500 for a club to purchase plants from sponsoring nursery in the voucher program.

Regional Publicity Director's Report (R. Valenza) -

Reminded attendees on Popularity Poll due September 01. Summer Newsletter contains purpose and requirements and a copy of the ballot for mailing purposes. In 2013, Region 6 participation was 31.2% and 2014 was 36.3%. We need to ensure each member includes their name, mailing address and club.

Motions passed to have a) Popularity Poll winner pictures added to the Region 6 website. Next Fall newsletter will have the winners for 2015 with a picture, and 2) to encourage more club participation, those clubs that have 95% of their members vote in the Poll will be eligible for a drawing to win \$ 250. This incentive will go into effect this year and go for the next 3 years. Motion passed by Loris Garrett and seconded by M. Valenza. Robert Valenza to work with Ray Houston to see if links can be created with Popularity Poll winners with photos on the Region 6 website.

Membership Report (L. Garrett) - Membership is showing a slight decrease in membership from 491 (September 2014) to 446 (April 2015). However, this is a dynamic number due to members renewing memberships later in the year. Club members are welcome to try out AHS membership for \$ 15 after July. This is a great way a club or individual can sponsor a new member.

Newsletter Editor Report (L. Pike) - Costs are increasing and color printing will be kept at a minimum except for the Fall/Winter Hybridizer Edition. Most of the newsletters will be in black and white with the exception of the seedling pictures. Some clubs are slow to deliver their reports.

Awards and Honors (Larry/Debbie Pike) -

Good response for seedling bed however heavy rainfall continues to be a problem with all growers this year. Articles are required for the newsletters and can be sent to larrydebbiepike@gmail.com. Good discussion on develop-

ing seedling bed guidelines for future garden hosts to use as a best practice. Larry Pike converted birdhouses to use for the ballot boxes which are clearly identified and easy to spot in a garden. These houses will be shared with the Region to use for future spring Meetings.

Youth Liaisons (Dan/Peggy Cathey) - working with clubs to increase interest in Daylilies with young people. Johnson County Iris and Daylily Society has new youth members.

New Business:

Newsletter – Board discussed investigating Cloud Technology to store newsletters. Due to the increased cost the Region may have to consider 2 printed versions a year and one web edition on the Region 6 Website. Motion to be presented at next Regional Meeting.

Awards and Honors: Mildred Schlumpf Photography Award sponsored by Region 6. Current practice is to send certificates to National Awards Chair for presenting at the National Convention to the winners and follow-up with an engraved plaque to be sent to their home showing the photograph and the state of Texas. Tim Closs is creating the two awards to be sent to the winners after the National Convention.

Board reviewed the award and passed a motion for Region 6 to continue to have this award for the next two years. M. Valenza to notify AHS on decision during the Fall Board Meeting.

2016 Nominating Committee For President Position:

Chairman Larry Pike, Eddie Raye Andrews and Loris Garrett recommended Tim Closs to serve a second term. This recommendation will be announced at Regional Meeting for members to vote. Ballots will be released in the Spring Newsletter for voting before the Regional Meeting.

Exhibition Judges Clinics and Garden Judges Workshops: Discussion regarding the need to have more judges for the Region since some judges are retiring. They will have 15 Regional beds developed for these daylilies. We received no response from the membership for these daylilies. Tim Closs will provide plants to be sent for Region 6 bed that represents a good example of the daylilies by Region 6 hybridizers.

Open Business:

Newsletter Committee – Board is looking for volunteer to support Larry on the newsletter. This is a great opportunity to learn how to pull together a newsletter and eventually become the Region Newsletter Editor. Other committees will be formed to shadow the current board members and get to understand their roles and responsibilities.

Upcoming Regional Meetings – Tim Closs announced that the Daylily Growers of Dallas will sponsor the Fall seminar in Dallas for the Regional Meeting in 2016. Region requires a sponsoring club for a fall or spring Meeting for 2017. Clubs can consider joining other clubs to sponsor a future Meeting.

Meeting was adjourned.

RUST Liaison
Summer 2015 Newsletter

I'm off to the farm. I hope all of you have an amazing and RUST FREE summer!

LONG LIVE HEMEROCALLIS!!

Now that summer time is here, most of us have hunkered down and are focusing on getting our plants into fall. The thermometer is soaring, and as the temperatures get hotter, rust tends to stay at bay. When it is 97 or hotter outside, I have found that rust no longer forms, as it is too hot for it apparently. But with that said, this spring was easily one of the worst we have experienced for rust in our Region, as we had tremendous amount of moisture and moderate spring/early summer temperatures...the ideal mix for rust. So the question now is, what is next?

I'm so glad I asked (:>)}! Ha! For me, I will do very little now until the fall. If rust starts appearing in October/November, I will probably opt to spray one or two more times until I can get to "winter"...i.e., a few days below 32. Once the cold spell hits, the rust will be gone until spring, or if the winter is very cold and long in duration, we may not see it at all until after bloom season. Our Region never gets cold enough to kill off the rust, but it does get cold enough to suppress it for a while. We'll take whatever we can get.

I wanted to offer a few updates on things I have seen this year concerning rust. First, the daylilies planted at my house here in Nacogdoches, the same ones planted 4 years ago that had a lot of rust, continue to show little to no rust. Each year, they have shown less, and I have not sprayed them for 2 years now with anything at all. I truthfully do not have an explanation for this, but continue to believe that the plants have built up a resistance to rust, much like our bodies, over time, develop resistance to various problems. At the farm, I have not seen the same. If I fail to spray, rust moves quickly there, and since we are open to the public during May/June, I have no choice but to spray well in advance so it is not seen at all. But I do wonder if I "let it go" like we have here at the house, what would be the results? I'll never get to do that, of course, but I do wonder.

I plan on writing an in-depth rust article for the Winter Region 6 Newsletter covering what products we are currently using, plus what others outside our area are using in their fight against rust. I will say in advance that of all the things I have done in my 5 years of owning the farm, the one that made the biggest difference was the culling of 1,000s, literally, of plants that showed very poor rust resistance. If plants showed a lot of rust, we dug them up and threw them away. We did this for 2 consecutive years, and the simple fact that we don't have near as many rust magnets seems to have had a significant impact on our ability to control rust now.

A list of various "green" and "brown" ingredients and how each affects decomposition was also provided. Everyone left with a new appreciation for the types of household waste that could be put into a home compost pile rather than being sent to a landfill.

"Polymerous Daylilies" was the focus of our program at the March meeting. Speaker John Turrentine (current President of the NTDS), explained what "polys" are and showed photos of several examples. He then stated that this behavior (extra tepals) is genetic and can be bred into seedlings. In closing, he argued that poly daylilies should have their own division in accredited shows.

About two weeks later, several members met at the Licatovich's garden to dig, clean and label many of the plants that would be used at our annual sale. Other members dug and prepared additional plants at their homes. The sale was held on March 27 & 28 at the usual Tyler location. The weather was beautiful and so the crowds were plentiful. We enjoyed another successful sale and fully funded our horticulture scholarship at Stephen F. Austin.

Tim Thompson, owner of Three Creek Gardens near McKinney, TX, was our April speaker. His topic was "Growing Your Best Daylilies". A Visit to Crainer's Daylily Farm

In an area on the outskirts of Brazoria, Texas (known as Churchill to locals), lies Crainer's Daylily Farm. The rural location belies the sophisticated hybridizing going on there. Everett & Chris Crainer have lovely daylily beds around their home, featuring hundreds of beauties from many well-known hybridizers, which they have collected over the years.

Chris especially enjoys incorporating companion plantings and garden art to provide additional visual impact. A garden bed of brightly colored Talavera "animal" planters filled with succulents, compliments the colors in the daylily beds.

Just beyond the shade of the huge Live Oak trees, lie the hybridizing "beds". Seedlings are planted in raised beds (typical for this part of the country). However, when the seedlings are culled, the ones selected for further evaluation are potted and placed into specially designed "ponds".

Everett Crainer did not "invent" this idea, but has successfully adapted it to his program. The ponds are comprised of secured landscape timbers in approximately 8' x 8' x 4" squares, lined with black plastic, and filled with a few inches of water. The lower portion of the pots provides access to the water in the ponds, thus reducing the need to water as frequently. This adds a level of consistency in our unpredictable Gulf Coast climate.

The best part of the ponds, are their potted contents: the Crainer's hybrid cultivars, of course! They range from minis – both singles and doubles (e.g., *H.* 'Gulf Coast Sun Burst' (2011)) – to huge XL blooms, many with eyes, edges & unusual forms. My new favorite is large *H.* 'Gulf Coast Cowboy Drifter' (2014), although there are many close contenders. Both *H.* 'Gulf Coast Karen' (2014 UF Crispate) and *H.* 'Gulf Coast Green Squaw' (2014) have unbelievable substance!

Everyone who comes to the garden has plenty from which to choose in selecting their own favorite. Everett has used the "Gulf Coast" prefix in naming all his hybrids. That was upon the advice of the late Inez Tarrant, one of Brazosport Daylily Society's members and daylily mentor.

However, by far, the most enjoyable part of visiting Crainer's Daylily Farm is spending time with Everett and Chris. They are so gracious and hospitable & love to talk about daylilies! They generously and freely share their wealth of knowledge, ideas and information with others to help promote daylily culture. They are true daylily "fans" (pun intended!) and are well deserving of this year's Region 6 Service Award.

Sandy's Beds and Beyond Daylily Garden

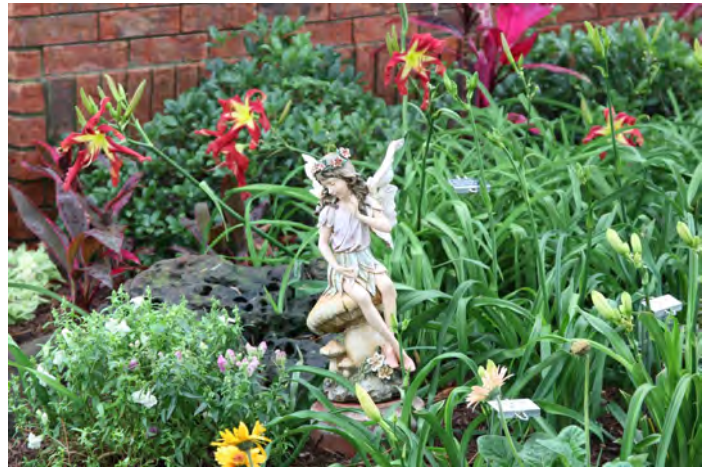

Bobbie and Bill Ware's Garden

When the first bus arrived at the Ware House, instead of walking towards the food or daylilies, a group of the Regional attendees headed straight to the nursery/potting area. They were curious about the seedlings and companion plants. They saw baby Queen Palms, Windmill Palms, Sego Palms, Purple Duranta plants, Amaryllis plants, Rain Lilies, Crinum, Jatropha Plants, and two types of Aloe Vera plants, as well as assorted succulents. One of the Spiny Aloe Veras was blooming, and there were several colors of Rain Lilies in bloom.

Guests were led to the front yard, where the daylilies were planted in raised beds bordered by rockwall border timbers that are actually plastic. A focal point of conversation was the shape of the fig tree. It has been trimmed to make it easy to mow under, and it is a great shady spot to stand under while viewing the daylilies. While peeking through the Potato Vines and Maid of Orleans Jasmine, several guests were excited at the sight of an unusual Stargazer Lily in the backyard. They were directed to go through the blue wooden gate, and to sit at the Butterfly Bistro table to have their photo taken with the waterfall and pool behind them, as well as a big assortment of blooming daylilies in front of them. The favorite guest plant, *H. 'Ron's Curls'*, by D. Hansen, was located in front of the table, so each person received a photo with the daylily in front of them, and the pool and waterfall with Shell Ginger blooming over it as the background.

Around the pool, there were tropical plants as well as daylilies. There were different varieties and colors of Hibiscus, including Singles, Doubles, and Dinner Plate Hibiscus. The Plumbago bushes were just starting to bloom, and there were Salmon Shrimp plants as well as Lemon Yellow and Fruit Cocktail Shrimp Plants along with a large Hummingbird Plant, Cigar Bush, Firecracker Bushes, Butterfly Bush, Butterfly Weed, and Purple Duranta Bush to attract hummingbirds and butterflies. The large White Bird of Paradise and the standard Orange Bird of Paradise were not in bloom yet. There were Purple, White, Gold, & Bandana Lantanas blooming, and the Sisters and Crotons, both Standard and Ribbon varieties making a splash of color in both the front & back yards.

Did I forget to mention Daylilies??!!!!

There are over 200 varieties of daylilies here, there, and everywhere!! *H. 'California Sunshine'*, *H. 'Gulf Coast Terry'*, *H. 'Rosie Meyer'*, *H. 'Ming Porcelain'*, *H. 'All About Eve'*, *H. 'Little Orange Tex'*, *H. 'Mildred's Endless Support'*, *H. 'Aly Marie'*, *H. 'Palo Duro Canyon'*, *H. 'Samuel Bell'*, *H. 'Dutch Yellow Truffle'*, *H. 'Princess Diana'*, *H. 'Doodlebug'*, etc. were some of the daylilies that were blooming. There was a scavenger hunt to find certain named varieties, and Ladybug rocks were marking the spots of those daylilies. Several people asked where we got the Garden Angels; some were from Hobby Lobby, and some were from Tuesday Morning. Bobbie made the red and blue lighthouses, and Bill installed almost 200 concrete border blocks around the pool landscaping. The "Daylilies on Propane" mural was painted by daughter Deanna

Ware. Assistance with planting, weeding, deadheading, serving breakfast in the garden and photography were done by Beki and Francis Spearman, Cheryl Brandenburger, son Michael Ware, and Deanna Ware, and was greatly appreciated!!!

2015 Region 6 Auction



As the Region 6 Auction was such a success, I was asked to write up what the Lone Star Daylily Society did to help other local societies and clubs in the future.

Basically, it started well over a year ago, during our planning stages for the Regional. During a Regional Meeting, the host club has an awesome responsibility and they can pretty well have the type of Regional Meeting that they want, except for a few items. One of those items is the Regional Auction. Back in 2003, it was the practice for the local host club to ask for donations to the Regional auction, from local members, clubs in Region 6, and even outside the Region to hybridizers, etc. As time moved on, some clubs did not have the membership to help with the Regional Auction and those duties were turned over to the Region. Tim Closs and Malcolm Avaritt have been performing at such a high level for the past several years, that many had forgotten what a 'chore' it was to get the plants, take care of them, and then transport them to the local Regional.

At Lone Star, we knew what they had been doing all along, and with a 'hand raise', decided to help both of them out and see what we could do to have the best auction fundraiser the Region has seen for some time. But, we needed someone to start asking for daylilies and to keep the daylilies. Well, guess who said, "I can do that"?

The main areas were: (1) the plants needed to be received as early as possible in order that they have a chance to multiply, (2) the plants would be potted and the name marked with a paint pen at the time of potting, (3) the plants would be kept watered with an irrigation system (at least every other day,

depending on the weather), (4) the plants would be kept fertilized, and (5) the plants would be sprayed for rust and pests. The daylilies were lined out in pots next to my other in-ground clump plants. They were kept in the full sun. Next, it was time to ask well known hybridizers to donate to our auction. First of all, I would like to say that a large group of these hybridizers have given a program to our local society at some time in the past decade, but mainly, our members purchase from these hybridizers. I was always up front that I was speaking for the local society and asking for the donations to the Region 6 Auction. Next, in order to "grease the pan" as they say, I decided to order a couple of plants from each hybridizer. Of course, hybridizers give bonuses. They were told that bonuses would be given to the Region. Then, I asked for them to donate to our Regional. With this process, I was not turned down one time from the hybridizers. Some were thrilled that we asked them to donate. They understood that up to 125 or more people would be looking at some of their introductions. Only one person would go home with their daylily, but many more might call to order that daylily in the future. Next thing I knew, we were overflowing with daylilies, and most were some of the latest introductions.

Next step was getting the list of names to Tim and Malcolm. Remember, I was only trying to get the donated plants and keep them. Tim and Malcolm took the names, found pictures, and made the spreadsheets with all the daylily information and the slide presentation. Tim and Malcolm then lot numbered the plants on the spreadsheet.

From the lot numbers, Debbie and Larry Pike made laminated lot number cards and stapled craft sticks to them to put in the potted daylilies. As they were laminated, we were able to put them in the pots a couple of weeks before the Regional. At the Regional, this came in quite handy, in getting the plants in the correct order. The bright and large lot numbers made a huge difference.

I certainly want to thank my mother Mildred Eskine, Beverly and Melvin Winkelman, and Paula Payne for their help in this project. If not for them, the overflow of daylilies would have been too much to handle. I want to also send a big thank you to Nate Williams. Nate helped me load over 150 potted daylilies to get them to the hotel. It sure was nice to see the daylilies blooming in the room the next morning. Finally, with the help of Beverly Winkelman, (like she was not doing anything), moving the daylilies from the staging room into the auction room. I know that Paula Payne was there and Sandy Roberts and some others that I am sure I have failed to mention, but once again, a big thank you to those that made it work.

In the end, it worked. We had over 150 daylilies to auction and with the GREAT work of Tim and Malcolm, the auction was a tremendous success. Region 6 attendees raised \$13,434. This was the highest figure in over a decade.

A note to the Region and the future local clubs. The Square

Card Reader has made a significant increase in our fundraising and over \$7,000 of the Region Auction money was by credit card. This makes a huge difference. You will be surprised how easy it is, how cost efficient it is, and the increase in the amount of money, even to a local club plant sale. Take credit cards and publicize it.

To all that helped with the Regional Auction, here is to a JOB WELL DONE!!!!

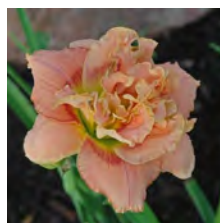
