For young children, the snow of last Thursday and Friday was something they had never seen. For the rest of us, it has been years.



Evansville toughens its water disconnection ordinance

Evansville now has an ordinance that clarifies its water shut-off policy. Action came at the town board meeting Monday night.

Customers who do not pay their balances by the 10th of the next month can expect their water to be shut off the

Trustee Dan Lohmann said the ordinance puts the village in line with what surrounding communities are doing. If a customer suffers unexpected circumstances, he or she still can come in to check on making payment arrange-

Local church group makes goodwill journey to Haiti

A group of 15 people from the area returned home December 9 after a week-long mission trip to Haiti.

As part of The Gathering mission church in Coulterville, Terry, Misty and Trenton Conway, Jeff and Leah Wagner, Tim and Wendy Bauersachs, Kevin and Kathryn Kuhnert, Karen Chamness, Art Ashbrook, Eric Karsten, Dustin Kuhnert, Crystal Nussel and Lyndsey Rosenlieb went on the trip. Rosenlieb joined the group in Georgia.

While there, the group stayed in a guest house by Alex's House in Kalico, Haiti. Alex's House is an orphanage that currently houses 32 children from babies to high school age. The Gathering is a sponsor of the orphanage.

Kalico is about an hour from Port-Au-Prince, the capital of Haiti. Port-Au-Prince was hit by a 7.0 earth-

quake in 2010. The death total was estimated at 300,000. Since the earthquake, it is estimated there are still 500,000 people who are food insecure and around 75,000 children under the age of five facing malnutrition.

"The orphanage is not just a place to keep kids," Terry Conway said. "It provides these kids with housing, food, clothing, life skills classes and helps them get schooling. This is what Haiti needs, the young people brought up in a manner to help turn the country and society around."

According to Terry, Haiti is the poorest country in the western hemisphere, and one of the poorest in the world. More than half of Haiti's population lives on less than \$1 each a day. About 50 percent of the Haitian culture practices VooDoo, but

Bardo gets 24 years in prison

Clifton L. Bardo of Sparta is going to prison. He was sentenced to 24 years in prison December 9 in Randolph County by Judge Richard Brown.

Bardo was found guilty by a jury October 22 of two counts of delivery of a controlled substance within 1,000 feet of a place of worship.

Bardo has an extensive criminal history with 10 felony convictions; however, he had previously never served more than five years in prison.

In addition to prison, Bardo was ordered to pay \$5,000 in drug assessment fees, which are mandated by Illinois stat-

At the sentencing hearing, the state asked for 25 years on each count to run concurrently, while Bardo requested the minimum sentence of six

"Certainly, we are pleased with the sentence," said State's Attorney Jeremy Walker. "I hope people in the drug culture and community take notice of this sentence. We will continue to work for similar results in other cases for those who continue to sell drugs in this county."

"Getting a prison sentence was a necessity in my mind in Holcomb's case," said Walker. "Offering to provide money to

someone to not show up in court undermines our entire system of justice.

"I also hope people in the drug culture and community take notice of this sentence, as well as those who work with law enforcement to curb the drug trade. The hardest part of getting people to work with us is their safety and being known as a snitch.

"My office takes threats or any communication with them seriously, and people who try intimidate or purchase testimony will be vigorously prosecuted for such actions."




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Steely is Sparta's 2013 police officer of the year



My how television weather people, both local and national, love a good storm, be it a tornado, hurricane or the winter variety. Most preempt regular



Christianity was prevalent in most areas where the group went, Terry said.

This is the third time Terry has made the trip to Haiti. This time, he said, they had a couple of people with them in the medical field, Misty and Karen.

"There was one kid who had a really nasty and deep wound on top of his foot," Terry said. "With the supplies we had, my wife treated the wound early in the week. Every day we went back and checked and bandaged it. By the end of the week, it looked really good. It probably saved the kid's foot."

This is just one example of how the group was able to help. Terry said they distributed a large amount of rice and beans to people.

"We do numerous construction projects while we are there," Terry said. "In the past, we've worked on helping people with housing in the area. We've put roofs on shelters and things like that. A lot of construction projects have been done at the orphanage to keep it up and running."

What the group does, though, varies every day, according to Terry. He said there is something for everyone. While some of the guys work on construction projects, some of the women might go into the community and meet with some of

He said the group devoted a lot of time at the orphanage spending time with and giving the children love. Every evening, the group participated in a Bible study with the community in what they called their church.

"The people are very outgoing," Terry said. "Every night when we worshiped with them, you could see it in the way they accepted us and in the way they worship.

"They don't care what anybody else thinks. It's a totally different world. They put us to shame when it comes to things like that."

One barrier that can come up is the language. The Haitians speak ancient creole. Terry said Jeff Wagner has been to Haiti a couple of times, as well, and knows some creole.

Terry has picked up some from Wagner and said even minimal knowledge of the language can make a big difference.

"When you're out walking and run into people, a lot of them might have stern looks on their faces, but if you stop and shake their hands and say hi, they just light up," Terry said. Terry said he has seen a lot of progress since he made his first trip to Haiti a year after the earthquake. He said the first time he was there, there were piles of rubble everywhere because most of the structures in the city were made of concrete. A lot of the rubble has now been cleaned up.

Another big change has been how many tent cities have started to finally disappear.

'When I walked out of the airport during my first trip there, I could see right across the street what they called a tent city," Terry said. "A tent city is just tarps thrown up like tents. The tents went as far as the eye could see. There were people leaning over the fence at the airport, reaching through and begging for stuff. That was the scene. It was chaos."

Since then, all of those people have been moved out. He also noted that when the earthquake hit, many people left the city and moved out into tent cities in the mountains. However, the number of those tent cities has

gone down, as well. He said just by looking at the mountains there is no way you would believe that people live up there, but they do. He said there is a water pipe that runs on top of the ground, down the mountain and goes all the way around the coastline. There is a hole inside the pipe with water spitting out of it that people will use to wash clothes and fill

Because of how they live the way they do in those kinds of conditions compared to what we have here, your heart goes out to them. I'll go back again in the future, there's no doubt."

Haiti still needs continual help. Terry said the group saw a lot of kids with the orange tints in their hair that are a sign of malnourishment. In many places, trash is just thrown out on the water bank to be washed away by the ocean.

Terry has seen a couple of Haitian men loading a tandem dump truck in a river bed with their bare hands because they don't have any other equipment.

"They use a lot of old Macdumptrucks,"Terry said. "Basically, everything they have is leftover from other countries. You can tell that with their clothing and everything they have."

Meanwhile, there are many groups that go to Haiti to help. Terry said that on their flight from Atlanta to Haiti and back, there were always other mission teams on the plane with them. Terry recommends that anybody who can go,

should go. "What I love is the simplicity of the place," Terry said. "When you're over there, you can sit back and a week will go by, but there is a peace about it."

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
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

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Sparta council stands by Link's lease contracts

Before he left office, former Sparta Mayor Rob Link signed lease agreements with two of the three farmers who plant crops on cityowned land. The leases run through 2015.

Link had signed lease extensions with Charlie Cowell and Kenny Baird. Dean Nehrt's lease has expired.

Monday night, the council agreed that the extensions as signed by Link will be honored, even though the council knew nothing about them. The city had hoped to increase the payments with new leases, but now there will be no changes until all of the leases expire.

Nehrt will also get his lease extended to 2015. so all three farmers have the same agreement with the city.

Mayor Charles Kelley said some of the farmers had already fertilized the land for next year's crops.

There had been talk earlier of taking the lease payments to \$150 an acre, but they will remain at \$75.

Although it was on the agenda, the council did not discuss amending its liquor ordinance, allowing for a BYOB li-

Martin and Darla Holman want to open a reception hall on East Broadway, but a new Class H license for bring-your-own liquor could require that liquor be a complement to food and that food make up the majority of the business income.

The change would allow the city to regulate BYOB businesses.

Kelley said the city needs more time to put a new liquor amendment together. There is a chance that the food issue might change.

The council met with Charlie Cowell about his work in tearing down some buildings about four years ago. Kelley said Cowell

billed the city \$65,000 for tearing down a house on Jackson Street and part of the Elwyn's building for the city.

Kellev noted that the city paid another company to tear down part of the Elwyn's building until the EPA stopped the project because of a buried chemical tank. Cowell finished that job.

Cowell was to get the Jackson Street property and the Elwyn's property for his work, but that has never been settled.

"The city feels his bill is excessive based on other work he has

done," said Kelley.

He said Cowell feels the bill is not excessive because of the extra costs he had in the Elwyn's project.

"The city wants an itemized bill," said Kellev.

Cowell has been adding interest to the bill each month, and Kelley said it is now up to \$99,000.

The council will hold a special meeting December 16 when it hopes to settle with Cowell.

Kelley also reported that the city is applying for a \$75,000 grant for money to help pay for the demolition of abandoned buildings. He said the fire department is also applying for a \$25,000 grant to help purchase equipment.

The police department will hold its annual Shop with a Cop program Saturday morning at 9 at Walmart. About 30 kids will get toys for Christmas through the program.

The city received no bids to sell property it owns at 335 S. Market Street. The minimum bid is \$7,500. The sale of the property will be sought again by bid.

The scheduled December 23 meeting has been canceled because of Christmas. The city clerk and finance commissioner will get together and pay the bills.

Property at 613 Cypress Lane was cited as abandoned and unsafe. The property has several code violations.

The tax levy was approved in the amount of \$555,418, an amount 4.9 percent higher than last year's property tax extensions.

The council agreed to purchase two Ford Explorer police vehicles from Iron Ford in Sparta for a total price of \$68,100, including most of the needed accesso-

The council will contract with Danny Ruppert of Coulterville to act as an agent to find a cheaper price on the open market for natural gas. The gas would be used at city facilities. Getting competitive prices could save the city an estimated 16 to 20 percent on its natural

Jackson County voter information

Over the past several weeks, every registered voter in Jackson County should have received a new voter registration card, according to Jackson County Clerk Larry Reinhardt.

This is the first step of the mandated biannual process to verify every registered voter's address. Jackson County must verify addresses on a regular basis due to the mobile nature of so many residents within the college community.

If someone moves to a new address prior to the 2014 election cycle, according to Illinois law, they must change their voter registration address prior to election day, or they cannot vote.

Changing an address with the postal service does not automatically change one's address with all other governmental agencies, such as for voter registration.

County clerk is verifying county addresses

This information must be updated separately with each individual agency.

If you believe you are registered to vote in Jackson County and have not received a new voter's card, there is a problem with the registration address, and you should contact Reinhardt's office.

The Gordons will open their house to help with Kenya water well projects

Gary and Roberta Gordon of Sparta will hold an old-fashioned Christmas, as they share their ancestral home now entering its 10th year in renovation.

Built in 1865 by Gary's great-grandfather Andrew Jackson Gordon upon his return from the Civil War, many rooms have been restored, leaving the brick exposed to show the original masonry.

The house is located at 7195 Gordon Road approximately four miles south of Sparta Roseborough Road. The open house will be Saturday, December 14 from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. with a suggested donation of \$10 a person, children

under 12 free. All proceeds will be used to produce water wells in Kenya.

The Gordons, along with neighbor Vic Hamer, formed their tiny mission organization in 2011 and called it Give Me Water Lord.

"GMWL is made up of members who are devoted, self-appointed servants of humanity, and there is no middle man, so all donations go directly to help the people of Kenya," said Roberta Gordon.

To date, accomplishments include:

• a well in Kasarani, Kenya that serves 30,000 people, and GMWL continues to maintain and pay the electric bill.

• a well in Kisumu, Kenya that serves Point of Grace School near Lake Victoria.

• the current project called Ches's well located one and a half hours north of Nairobi in the Maasai community of Kitengela.

"Ches's well is the most expensive well that we have accomplished, costing over \$30,000 because beyond the drilling, casing and pump, a holding tower has been erected and solar panels to generate power," said Gordon.

It should be finished December 15, and the community will get clean water for the first time in their lives.

"Since Gary and I began to help Vic in 2011, we have continually been overwhelmed at how local friends, churches and people in our community and surrounding area

have been so willing to help," said Gordon. "We are amazed at what caring people can accomplish \$10 and \$20 at a time. There are so many Christians to thank.'

Gordon said she hopes people will come out to the house in spite of the snow. "We will try to have

the driveway cleared, but folks should plan to wear warm clothes and dry footwear, as they may have to walk a short distance," said Gordon.

She said the Kenyan women love anything from the United States so they are collecting bright-colored nail polish and lipstick. Donations are welcome.

The open house will include coffee, hot chocolate and cookies.

The business generally employs seven or eight people to wait tables, cook, prepare orders and wash dishes. While many of these are young people, all of the cooks must be experienced and properly credentialed for restaurant

Muskopf would like to eventually pass the business on to one of her children or grandchildren. Her daughter Sarah is currently working at Granny's but is getting married

in the near future and will move from Steeleville. While supporting the marriage, Muskopf will miss both Sarah and her three children. She hopes one or more will want to carry on the family restaurant tradition.

Muskopf admits running a restaurant has its challenges, including long hours and six or seven-day work weeks. Although Granny's is closed Mondays, she is often there doing cleaning or mainte-

Recently, a freezer quit working. It had to be moved to make room for a replacement, which she hopes will be covered by insurance. Then there are the concerns of anyone running a small business, including setting prices that are reasonable for customers but will cover the business costs.

Granny's has Facebook page, set up by a tech-savvy family

member, but a quick check showed that it needed some updating, a task which Muskopf plans to undertake herself. Googling the name of the restaurant turned up a web page associated with the correct address in Steeleville but was for an entirely different franchise business.

Such technological problems were not a concern of restaurateurs a generation ago.



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

Several members offered their views and opinions. Focus groups will continue with Smith, Emge and Mulholland visiting other area organizations over the course of the next few weeks

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

Pinckneyville will keep insurance with Risk Mgmt

The city of Pinckneyville will do better on its insurance rate by staying with Arthur J. Gallagher Risk Management Services than going with a plan presented by the Illinois Municipal League.

The commissioners voted Monday night to renew the property, workers' compensation and liability insurance with Risk Management. Under the plan presented by Jessica Govic, the city will pay \$144,700. That is a savings of just under \$20,000 over the plan presented by the Municipal League.

Govic said recent tornadoes have caused property insurance rates to jump. That is combined with the fear of a potential earthquake along the New Madrid fault at some point.

 $Even \, so, Govic \, said \, the$ major factor in higher rates is being driven by workers' compensation claims. She noted that Illinois is ranked the fourth highest state in workers' comp claims.

The current plan expires the end of December, and the city plans to file a claim prior to that after recent snowfall led to some water damage to the city hall.

Commissioner Leonard Heisner Jr. said the damage was located in the outer wall behind the brick facade of the city clerk's office. He said work will not start until after the snow

In other notes, the commissioners chose not to make changes in the city's ordinance regarding leaf burning.

Currently, residents are allowed to burn leaves in their yards between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. They may also have city workers pick up leaves that are raked to the edge of their property for a \$20 per load fee.

Commissioner Sam Fulk said residents can also hire a private company to haul away leaves and yard debris if they choose.

Jeana Raines and Lois Heisner had addressed the city council several meetings ago asking them to institute a complete ban on burning leaves and yard debris. The city received three complaints recently from residents regarding leaf burning. Still, the council said it will not enact a burn ban at this time.

The council voted to list a 1970 truck owned by the fire department as surplus property. The truck and an attached generator will be sold to the highest bidder.


Eligible landowners and operators in all states and territories can enroll in CSP. A CSP self-screening checklist is available to help producers determine if the program is suitable for their operation.
